Then the shuttlers were back, and after a Safety talk Matt tricked Michelle into giving, we were off! We had somewhere in the neighborhood of 18 boats – mostly a mix and cats and rounds, an IK and a hard sheller. The flow was nowhere near the 8000 cfs it had been at the Boaters 101 class back in May when Spencer's Hole flipped 3 rafts and dump-trucked a catboat. I had chickened out on that float – not being a very confident catboater – so I was hoping the flows today at 3200 cfs were going to be kind to me. As I came though Spencer's Hole I noticed there were a whole bunch of boaters RIGHT THERE, right on the side of the hole and I thought "why is everyone gathered right here – did something happen?". And then I realized, no... nothing had happened, but they are right there if something DID happen. It is such a privilege to float rivers with such an awesome group of individuals who actually stand by what they say. Every trip begins with a safety talk – and they mean it. Safety is their number one priority. They take it seriously and I can't tell you how much I respect and appreciate that. I'm happy to report Spencer's Hole caused no carnage this day. As we floated further down the river I enjoyed seeing the beginnings of the fall colors appearing along the riverbank, not yet in full color. We stopped for lunch under the bridge and lucked out to have a dry spell while we were entertained by a group of young people jumping off the rocks. It looked to be at least a 25- foot drop to the water. The first jumper was hesitant to go, so the OWA folks – always willing to help out -- started yelling "Jump!! Jump! Jump!!". NICE! After we shoved off from lunch and continued on our way, the fickle day waffled between sun and rain. And more rain at the takeout while we all helped each other out loading up all our boats. And as I got in the truck and we drove away, I thought about the day we had, that was more rain than sun - but I did feel lucky, very lucky to have joined this organization of fine men and women – and to be able to float down rivers with them. I look forward to more trips with the OWA, and all I can do to learn and contribute and to be a part of these wonderful trips.

Wilderness First Aid Submitted by Reporter Jeff

To my fellow members of the Oregon Whitewater Association:

I am new to the OWA. I joined in September of this year. The last weekend of September I took the opportunity to participate in the annual Wilderness First Aid course that OWA offers. This is one of the reasons I wanted to Join OWA. I have spent 40 yrs rafting in Oregon an have always wanted to improve my knowledge and confidence in handling difficult situations in the back country.

The WFA course was held at Dodge Park, near Sandy, OR. It started on Friday night with a four hour overview of the weekend's goals. The training course was conducted by Travis Reid, of Oregon Rescue from Bend, Oregon. Travis was accompanied by Matt, a paramedic and Firefighter; Julie, who is an Registered Nurse working in Hospitals in Oregon - she has a lot of experience; and Brian who is a trained EMT.

I have been through many First Aid and CPR courses but nothing like Oregon Rescue's WFA. The methods used to infuse this information were very effective. It was all hands on. After we discussed a certain approach to evaluating or treating a patient we would immediately break-up into small groups and practice what we were taught.

One of the things I liked the best was the simple manner of how to approach each step in the process. As Travis liked to say, "I only have five fingers on one hand. I am going to keep the process to under five things so I can remember what they are." So that is how we were instructed throughout the weekend.

On Saturday the entire group was there at 8 am, about 35 people. And thanks to Bill our OWA safety coordinator, he kept us full of hot coffee and treats. Thanks Bill!

The day started with the "three step approach" to arriving at the scene of the accident. LOOK GOOD, call for help, evaluate the mechanism of the accident to assure the site is safe to proceed. This same simple approach was used to evaluate the patient's condition and method of treatment. So we know if we are going to "Stay and Play" or "Blow and Go". Our goals in First Aid are to Locate, assess, stabilize and transport (L.A.S.T.).

What really made this an effective course was the ability to practice what we were taught. Over and over we drilled. Giving us all a chance to play all the parts in a rescue. From being a patient's advocate during a rescue, to performing as Incident Commander in charge of the rescue effort itself, to being the patient in the middle of everyone's efforts. There was also all the information needed to treat burns, bleeding, neck and back injuries, broken bones, snake bites and hypothermia. It was a long and productive day.

On Sunday we were promised a busy day and they delivered. We were given a lot of additional information on various medical situations and how to successfully clean and bandage open wounds. We continued to run through scenarios involving a variety of accidents and injuries. Scott our poor OWA President was smashed on a rather large rock under a truck with a nasty head wound. We had bear attacks, and multiple people injured in the Sandy River for goodness sake. We definitely had a lot of practice treating for hypothermia.

It was a lot to digest in three days but it was a really valuable experience. I would recommend it to everyone. By the end of the day on Sunday I was tired but I had learned so much information. I want to say thank you to everyone for making me feel right at home. I look forward to the April 2018 Swift Water rescue course.



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
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Recipe of the



INGREDIENTS

- 1 large onion, peeled and diced
- 2 cloves garlic, peeled and minced
- 1 Tbs grated ginger
- 1Tbs thyme
- 1/2 tsp ground nutmeg
- 1 tsp ground cinnamon
- 3 large sweet potatoes, peeled and diced
- 6 cups vegetable stock
- zest and juice of 1 orange
- 1 1/2 cups unsweetened almond milk
- salt and freshly ground
- black pepper to taste



Sweet Potato Bisque

DIRECTIONS

Serves 6

- 1. Place the onion in a large saucepan and sauté over medium heat for 10 minutes. Add water 1-2 Tbs at a time to keep the onions from sticking to the pan. Add the garlic, ginger, thyme, nutmeg, and cinnamon and cook for 1 minutes. Add the sweet potatoes, vegetable stock, and orange zest and juice and bring the pot to a boil over high heat. Reduce the heat to medium and cook, covered, for 25 minutes, or until the sweet potatoes are tender.
- 2. Puree the soup using an immersion blender or in batches in a blender with a tightfitting lid, covered with a towel. Return the soup to the pot and add the almond milk. Cook an additional five minutes, or until heated through, and season with salt and pepper.

Knot of the Month -Water Knot

Each month we will showcase essential knots you should know for river situations

Overview

- Used to join 2 ends of webbing together to make a loop
- Start by tying a basic overhand knot
- Finish by retracing the not in the opposite direction
- Ends must be on opposite side of the knot to be correct
- Be sure to leave a long tail on each side of the knot in case it slips, or tie it off with overhand knots on each side
