Next thing you know, we were parked on rock, close to the end of the fish ladder. I meant to do that...lol. The only problem was that boat was tipped sideways and this meant that I couldn't use one of my oars. Rather than get off the rock too quickly, I decided to provide a service to the next cataraft. You know, take one for the team. Sure enough a 16' cataraft came around the corner and smacked right into us and pushed us further up on the rock. There were several people with a rope connected to the cataraft pulling while we pushed until the cataraft broke free. OWA SAFETY ARTICLE: SAFE DOWN RIVER TRAVEL

As we all know, there are many elements that go into keeping our river trips safe. We start with extensive pre-planning that includes assessing water level and levels of experience and boating skills within the group, bringing proper equipment and gear for the river, buying food, setting shuttles, and all the other fun details that we get to daydream and plan for before we even get in our cars to drive to the river.

Once we launch, there are some very important safety tips that will remind us to pay attention, keep track of our group, and act in a constantly safety conscious manner. Being that I truly do love acronyms to use as a "check list"; I personally love one that I learned from the Brits! CLAP!

- **C-Communication.** This is a reminder to constantly communicate. How is everyone? Are you comfortable with the run? Do you have the right gear? What signals are we using for downriver travel? Do we have a cell phone, InReach, or other for emergency communication if necessary. Constant check ins with others in the group can also help prevent things such as hypothermia, getting in over our heads, etc. Yes, we preplan, and have gone over most of this before; but constant communication during the trip is also exceptionally important.
- L- Line of Sight. Everyone needs to stay within line of sight all of the time. We generally keep track of each other by watching the boat behind us to avoid losing line of sight. This works great, but we also must pay attention to our overall group spacing. The higher the water, the closer we need to stay together to be able to assist each other, and keep from getting too spread out.
- A Avoidance of Hazards: This reminds us of not only of the importance of staying on line, scouting when necessary, and taking responsibility for staying in our boats; but should also be a reminder that hazards are going to change depending on the weather, and other factors. A big breaking wave that might be fun to crash through on a warm sunny day could become a hazard to avoid on a cold, wet day with folks in the front of your boat that are already struggling to stay warm.
- **P- Position of Most Usefulness:** This is actually one of my favorites! It is brilliant, and what we should all be striving to do. It is going to be different for each participant and paddler. This is the concept of ALWAYS being attentive to where things may go wrong, and then being in a position to help prevent a mishap, or in a good position for rescue. This could be the paddler that points positive and away from a strainer, or the paddler that foresees a potential swim, and is right there in the closest eddy to assist from. It is a dynamic, constantly changing way of thinking. For a beginning boater, this position may be simply paying attention to not becoming a swimmer themselves. For a more experienced boater, it is knowing the exact place to be if something does go wrong.

CLAP is one of those simple acronyms that helps remind us of some of the mostimportant components of keeping our downriver travel safe.

How to play the game

- 6. A gift cannot be "stolen" more than twice. So whoever steals it second gets the gift.

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Knot of the Month




Figure 8 Follow Through

Overview

- It is a very strong knot & easy to tie
- Great for tying into a fixed anchor point, or around a frame or D-ring which you cannot pass а gool over/through

Use

- At the end of a rope as an anchor point, attach to a tree or raft frame or any other closed attach point
- To form a permanent loop





The key is to retrace the existing 8.

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

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
